IS THERE MORE TO FEBRUARY THAN WE MIGHT THINK?

Dear All,

It's February; I wonder how many of us would admit to this not being our favourite month of the year? The excitement of Christmas lies behind us and the full beauty of spring still to come. February is often known as 'February fill dyke' and this year, I think we'd all agreed we don't want it to live up to that name! Yet when we look at it, February is a full month with some good things going on. Perhaps it is a good time to wonder and ponder on the different aspects of February, while we still feel like hibernating, as we prepare for Lent starting on February 26th.

February 2nd is Candlemas, a festival of lights. It falls on the midpoint between the shortest and longest days. It celebrates Jesus as the Light of the World, who came and comes to bring light to the lost and lonely, to the afraid, who comes in the dark. Perhaps we could ponder how we can help to spread light in the dark places of our world.

There are snowdrops, also known as Candlemas bells. They are symbol of hope. The story goes that when Adam and Eve were driven out of Eden, Eve was about to give up hope that the cold winter would ever end. An angel appeared and transformed a snowflake into a snowdrop, a promise that winter does give way to spring. Where do we need hope?

As a reminder to give thanks for all who serve us, February 6th is the anniversary of the Queen coming to the throne in 1952.

There are many saints days, the best known being St Valentine on 14th. Many a grey day has been cheered by the arrival of a card or some roses. Little is known about St Valentine but it's believed he was a priest or bishop who ministered to persecuted Christians. It's said he defied the order of the Roman Emperor and married Christian couples. Perhaps we could give thought and prayer to the many, many Christians in the world who are today persecuted for their faith.

February 29th is with us this year. The tradition is that on this day women could ask men to marry them. In the 5th century, St Bridget petitioned St Patrick to allow women a more active role in choosing their husbands. They were allowed to do so on this day every 4 years! In some places, men were fined if they refused. Perhaps we could pray for couples today, for the strengthening of the bonds of relationship, and of faithfulness. THE BEST IS YET TO COME – A REFLECTION ON SIMEON, ANNA and CANDLEMAS

No matter how much we plan for things to be good, no matter how much we prepare, life is never perfect. I wonder if Mary thought that when she had let go of any dream or plan she had for everything to go smoothly in her own life.

I wonder if she grew up dreaming of a husband who would take care of her, for a baby or two to come along at the right time..... I don't think anyone would have planned to have an angel appear and tell her that she was pregnant, and near to full term, when they need to travel to Bethlehem for a census, and so give birth away from home, in an outhouse.....

And although the dedication of Jesus would have been different from our baptism services, we know how parents want these key events to go perfectly and it probably wouldn't involve two elderly people coming out of the shadows and going on about how wonderful our new baby was and well, how he would be a controversial character and cause distress and pain to his mother. Mary and Joseph call into the Temple to have a quiet moment to offer Jesus to God. But all of a sudden they realise that nothing will ever be the same again.

But even though none of this was what Mary and Joseph had in mind, I don't think they would have swapped this rollercoaster ride experience for anything. Mary had learnt a while back to let go of any control of her life, and allow God to lead her.

But let's go back to that Candlemas story, what do we learn from it for today? Well I think we can learn something about being patient as we go through life, and certainly both Anna and Simeon had plenty of patience. They showed how the most significant thing that had ever happened to them happened right towards the end of their lives.

Our society devalues older people and especially older women. They are supposed to inject botox into their faces to get rid of wrinkles, and spend a fortune on creams, even have surgery to make their bodies more perfect. And nowadays, many men do the same. It's as though we're not allowed to grow old any more. But the example of Simeon and Anna shows us that in terms of our own ministry and discipleship the best is always yet to come.

But no experience is perfect, life is bitter sweet. And this is true certainly of candlemas as a festival. It is a half and half festival, half joy, half lament. The sweetness of the birth of Jesus and the joy of Christmas, but the bitterness of now turning towards the cross and Lent and the reflection of what the Cross of Christ means in Christian life.

But in terms of our own ministry and discipleship, the best is yet to come. I wonder how that makes you feel We often hear people say that they used to do such and such but now they are too old. As if the real work of the church is doing things, planning events, being active. But praying for church events and activities is just as important as running it. And picking up the phone to have a chat with a friend from church who hasn't been for a while is as much pastoral care as when the vicar visits someone in hospital.

In church there is no retirement age. While it's true, we don't actually value our elderly people enough, the story of Simeon and Anna challenges us about what ministry really is and who can do it.

Most people would have disregarded Anna as an elderly woman who didn't have much to offer the world because she was a bit religious, always in church praying. But because she was in church she was in the right place at the right time, and her wisdom and spirituality spilled out into those prophetic words said to Mary and Joseph.

Likewise if our gift is to be quiet, in the background, praying then continue to develop this, as our communities and churches need you and your wisdom.

The story of Simeon and Anna challenges us all, whatever age we are, what is our calling from God for today, and for tomorrow? How am I serving him and his people, right now? Is there anything else I could offer?

In our Woodfield Team of Churches, we need all hands on deck. We don't have the luxury of thinking I'm too old, or I'm not a good enough Christian. Who is! But there is a challenge for us all today. Am I living my unique calling within the family of my church and in my community? If the answer is yes, then that's great. Take time to value what you are offering and to be appreciative that you are in the right place at the right time. If the answer is no.... then it's time to do something about it.
