As you may imagine, the demand for food from Food Banks has increased dramatically as people have been thrown out of work and there are benefit delays. Can you help by donating food, or money?

USE OF ST JOHN'S FOR PRIVATE PRAYER AND FUNERALS.

It's impossible at time of writing to be totally up to date as to what will be possible in July as regards the church building. There is no start date yet for being open for public worship.

As from July 15th, church buildings may be opened for private prayer and for funerals. Around that simple statement is a whole load of detail that we have to comply with in order to open: risk assessments, signage, sanitizing etc.

We are working on it as hard as we can.

As with all the well publicised guidance, those who are infected with Covid 19, are self- isolating or in extremely vulnerable groups should not come.

We aim to:

- Open for private prayer Tuesdays through to Thursdays. Watch out for the 'church open' sign or check website.
- Open for funerals but as with funerals at the crematorium or at the graveside, the limit on numbers at
 present will be 10. Singing cannot be allowed. This will mean services do not have to be totally at the
 graveside which is difficult in English weather. Again check the website nearer the time, to make
 certain of the start date.

TRANSFORMATION OF ST. JOHNS

Despite lockdown progress continues to be made.

- Before lockdown, test holes were dug to enable the new floor to be designed. Structural engineers inspected to see 'what was what' but then progressed slowed because lockdown closed their offices so the design is still in preparation.
- We visited the organ manufacturer but a second visit to another showroom had to be cancelled because of lockdown.
- Viewings of tables and other proposed furnishings are on hold for same reason.
- We have pretty well agreed the colour scheme and design for the inner glass doors and the new reredos
- The final scheme is very nearly ready to present to the ecclesiastical planners. \if they agree our proposals, we can go ahead and put our case to the Chancellor of the Diocese (a Judge), who makes the final decisions as to whether we will be allowed to reorder the church. However, Diocesan staff have been on furlough, so there is some slowing there.
- Shortly we will be applying for planning permission to NWLD Council for permission to undertake
 work that changes the exterior of the building with the installation of a vent pipe for the new boiler
 and the development of a new refuge area for wheelchairs at the rear door which becomes a fire
 exit.
- Lockdown has provided us time to work through documentation such as Statements of Need, Statements of Significance, and Case for Change. Hors have been spent by a dedicated team on these necessary aspects of the project.
 - Overall we are getting there. Progress is being made.

The NHS #TESTANDTRACE system has gone live to help reduce the spread of #Covid19. Here's some information on how the system works and what to be aware of. NHS Test and Trace will only call you from 0300 0135000, or send you texts from NHS directing you to https://contact-tracing.phe.gov.uk *WE WOULD ADVISE TYPING THIS IN TO YOUR BROWSER RATHER THAN CLICKING ON A LINK IN A TEXT MESSAGE* You could, if you wish, visit this website and save it in your browser so that if you do get a message, you can go to

your saved page safe in the knowledge that you are on the safe and correct page.

UK GOV have a webpage all about how the Test and Trace system works and it also contains a section detailing what tracers WON'T do or ASK to help you avoid being caught out by potential fraudsters https://gov.uk/guidance/nhs-test-and-trace-how-it-works (if you prefer, rather than clicking this link search for GOV UK Test and Trace)

Contact tracers will:

•

- call you from 0300 013 5000
- send you text messages from 'NHS'
- ask you to sign into the NHS test and trace contact-tracing website
- ask for your full name and date of birth to confirm your identity, and postcode to offer support while self-isolating
- ask about the coronavirus symptoms you have been experiencing
- ask you to provide the name, telephone number and/or email address of anyone you have had close contact with in the 2 days prior to your symptoms starting
- ask if anyone you have been in contact with is under 18 or lives outside of England
- Contact tracers will NEVER:
- ask you to dial a premium rate number to speak to us (for example, those starting 09 or 087)
- ask you to make any form of payment or purchase a product of any kind
- · ask for any details about your bank account
- ask for your social media identities or login details, or those of your contacts
- ask you for any passwords or PINs, or ask you to set up any passwords or PINs over the phone
- disclose any of your personal or medical information to your contacts
- provide medical advice on the treatment of any potential coronavirus symptoms
- ask you to download any software to your PC or ask you to hand over control of your PC, smartphone or tablet to anyone else
- ask you to access any website that does not belong to the government or NHS

LOCUST PLAGUE IN EAST AFRICA

Just as we were beginning to realize that Coronavirus was here, we were aware of how others were struggling in our world. In particular we were aware of something that was hardly reported in this country: the locust plague affecting East Africa. So we started to collect to bring relief for that area and were able to send £250 from across the Woodfield Team to Action for Hunger at the end of March. The charity wrote:

However the situation is growing worse for them. Here in England we think we have problems....East Africa is on the brink of a third wave of locust attacks. East Africa has already been devastated by a series of desert locust infestations in the past few months. Between January and April up to 1.3 million hectares of land and 200,000 hectares of crops were destroyed in Ethiopia.

It is feared the favourable dry season and drought conditions will provide the optimum breeding ground for the insects in time for the next harvest. After multiplying into their millions, the locusts then emerge during the rainy monsoon season to wreak havoc.

The East Africa regional organisation found up to 350,000 tons of cereals had been destroyed by locusts between January and April. The United Nations (UN) estimates a swarm of locusts can contain anything between 40-80 million insects. A swarm in those numbers is capable of digesting the same amount of food in a day as three million people.

Efforts to spray pesticide have been hampered by Coronavirus restrictions on the movement of planes, material and people to do that work. How can we help these people who have so little? Prayer and generosity?
