# **'BUILDING FOR ALL' PROJECT: GOOD NEWS!**

Regular readers of Grapevine will know we've been working for many years at making St John's Church a 'Building for All'. While the church will primarily continue to serve as an important place of worship, our vision into the future is of a building becoming a place for all to use.


A flexible space: for the wider community to make use of, to replace that lost when the Church Hall was closed for safety reasons in 2007; a place where Clubs might meet; where families could party and celebrate special occasions; where 'get togethers' could be held, a place of congregation and fellowship; an amenity that will serve the local community well into the future.

It has meant years of careful thinking and planning to hold those two concepts together well. Plans have been batted to and fro as the church will look very different internally but not changed on the outside. We've held public meetings to share the plans.

The Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC), effectively the church planning department, look at what is proposed and make recommendations or suggest some amendment, they inform and invite consultation from heritage bodies and so forth. However the final decision is made by the Chancellor of the Diocese, who is a judge.

The good news is that at its September meeting, the DAC supported and recommended our proposals. Public notices are going up and can be seen on the church notice board, in church and on our website - like council planning notices. Once their specified publication/consultation period has expired, the whole lot goes to the Chancellor for a final decision as to whether we can get on with transforming St Johns as we propose or further adjustments are required.

Hope this little plan gives an idea of what we'll look like.



## SUNDAY CHURCH SERVICES FOR THIS MONTH

Since the 2<sup>nd</sup> August, we've been testing the water with regard to Sunday worship and what we are able to maintain with the need to sanitize the building. So we're having 3 services across the 8 churches of the Woodfield Team each Sunday – so the services move round. It's worked well so far in August so will continue into September. We'll review again when we see how Coronavirus clears (or doesn't). It isn't the same pattern as August as we have weddings on Saturdays in some churches in September so do not want to use that building the next day.

September services look like this and you would be welcome at any of our village churches if Donisthorpe isn't open that Sunday:

September 6<sup>th</sup>: Measham (Morning Prayer); Appleby and Snarestone (Holy Communion)

September 13<sup>th</sup>: Normanton (MP), Donisthorpe and Swepstone (HC)

September 20<sup>th</sup>: Norton juxta Twycross (MP), Measham and Packington (HC)

September 27<sup>th</sup>: Appleby (MP), Normanton and Donisthorpe (HC)

We owe a debt of gratitude to our churchwardens and all helpers who are making this possible as there is a lot of work involved in cleaning and rearranging things. Do remember face masks do have to be worn in church now. It does feel different at a service as there is no singing and we are all dotted around the building at due distance, and we mustn't shake hands and so forth. It has however been great to be back together giving thanks to God, praying together and learning together.

Sadly Ceriann's 3 year contract with us ends this month. It's hard to know where that 3 years has gone. Ceriann has been involved in many things: Ready Steady Stick, our 2 team play and stay groups, encouraging those in Sunday clubs and setting up a Youth group. ## **REFLECTION - What does God think about social distancing?**

What does God think about social distancing? It might seem a funny question to ask but actually I think God has quite strong opinions on this.

Hear me out.

First up I think God would encourage us, urge us even to observe all the guidance, all the instruction we are given. Keep a good distance, avoid unnecessary travel, the whole lot. Maybe you are thinking 'OK but would God really care? Doesn't sound like His normal thing.

Well God likes life, in fact God loves life. Jesus even says He **IS** life and all the evidence says social distancing will help to preserve and protect life. So I'm pretty convinced He's encouraging His people – all people – to do their bit with that.

But I think God might not like this social distancing, while really necessary at this time is not what He really wants for us in the long term

You see, when I read The Bible, when I look at what God is like, the word 'distance' is not a word that sits well with Him. God isn't about distance, staying away. He's about relationship, coming close.

And let's face it, nobody likes social distancing. Even the introverts amongst us, we might like a bit of space ourselves, but not like this. Not all day - everyday. Not through no choice of our own. Not on the scale that we are experiencing currently.

But why is that? Why does it seem to go against the core of who we are?

I believe it's because it goes against the core of who God is and we are made to be like Him. And His way of working is to get closer and closer, not further and further.

Three months before lockdown and social distancing began, before we were setting up home offices and shutting ourselves away; we were putting up decorations, dressing trees, going to parties. At the heart of those Christmas celebrations was the earth shattering and destiny changing truth that God became one of us. That's how much He wanted to be close. He didn't stay away – He entered in.

He didn't see distance as good or travel unnecessary; no He did what He did to achieve what He wanted. And what He wanted was this – You and Me – to be close to us; have a relationship with us; be friends with us. So as you practice social distancing – and again you must – please hear this. There is no need for SPIRITUAL DISTANCING. Remember God likes life. He loves life. He **IS** life and the life He invites us to means we are never distant, never apart, never alone.
