REFLECTION

The following is a sermon preached by Canon Christopher Cox at Evening Prayer at Packington On Epiphany 6^{th} January 1985 Text: Isaiah 49: 7 – 13 and John 2: 1 – 11.

He outlines lessons that we might learn from The Wisemen as we follow our own star in our search to find Jesus for ourselves. I've taken it from his short book 'Echoes From The Pulpit Sermons in Retirement 1983 - 1993'. It's a bit of a blast from the past but still valuable teaching and still relevant. Also it's a tad early for The Wisemen who don't come around in the church calander until January time but we will meet them in all the nativity plays, carol services, Christingles that we will attend over the Christmas period. For those of you who might remember Canon Cox it could be quite nostalgic **Blessings Derek Tomlin.**

THE OBJECT OF THE SEARCH

The spate of Holiday Programmes, Travel Brochures and Ads. On TV has led me to recall past Summer Breaks - including a week on North Yorkshire Moors. There, a 20th century 'blot on the landscape' the Fylingdates Early Warning Station.

Modern Man has spent billions of pounds since the Last War in putting objects into Space. Some to our great gain - telecommunication and weather satellites, linking nation with nation, enabling us to watch events around the world, and giving us more accurate forecasts.

c) At the same time, as this week's Geneva Talks begin, we find ourselves facing the real possibility of a Star-Wars situation. How important it is to keep track of all the things that Man has put up in the HEAVENS. All round the world there are highly trained experts keeping their eye on the sky. 'Watch this Space' has taken on a new meaning.

God's Initiative:

a) 2000 years -even 40 years ago -it was very different Everything 'out there' was recognised as God's.

- b) 'The heavens declare the glory of God, and the firmament showeth His Handiwork' (Ps. 19) Men Searched the skies for revelations of His activity, watched that Space for signs of His coming.
- c) That search was the nightly occupation of the Magi, whose journey to Bethlehem is much in the minds of Christians today.

God had put a new Star into orbit to lead them to the showing forth (Epiphany) of Himself in the child born to Mary.

The first fundamental truth to be learned from the Story is that in our search for Him, GOD always takes the initiative. Before Men, however wise, could start their quest, He acted. 'In the beginning God'. 'In the beginning was the word'.

d) Our search is only possible because He is there to be found. We can only begin to understand because He has given us the power to do so. We can only pursue our search because He has placed the clues that will lead us to the Treasure.

Let us grasp this truth afresh as we continue our journey.

The initiative both in our search and in our Salvation lies with Him.

'We love Him because He first loved us'.

Use God-given Talents:

- a) If God has made the first move, it is for Man to respond That Star was on the Astrologers' horizon. They were now to use their powers of observation and deduction.
- b) By using their God-given talents they were able to discover the clue that was to lead them to the Christ.
- c) They found God 'in the everyday' (everynight?\). Retreats, Quiet Afternoons, special occasions have their place -but it is as we get on with our job throughout the coming months, using all that God has given us, that we may 'see His Star'. He is ahead of us and we shall see proofs of His Presence and signs of His guidance as we go on our way.

Sources of Guidance:

a) The story of the Magi's Pilgrimage also shows that we must use our ability to enquire from others and learn from their knowledge and experience. The natural place to look for a Prince was Jerusalem.

There they were helped on the road to Bethlehem by the Scriptures and the understanding of them possessed by others.

c) Those Wisemen were humble enough to ask their way. We need the help of others too. I remember meeting a Hospital worker in Leicester who described herself as 'a human signpost' directing people to X-Ray Dept. Out-patients etc. We need such people -to <u>be</u> such people, as we Search, not the Sky but the Scriptures in the coming months.

Conclusion:

- a) As we have thought before this Christmas. The Magi were led to The Unexpected. A lowly place in a little Town. It must have been tempting to think there had been some mistake. Yet they worshipped and presented their gifts.
- b) So often Life doesn't turn out in the way we anticipate -this is as true of our spiritual experience as it is of anything else.

Those men had responded to God's Initiative, used their faculties, sought help and advice and been prepared, finally, to recognise God's Son in the Unexpected.

c) There will be many things in 1985 that will surprise us, events we cannot foresee. experiences we do not anticipate.

If we set out from tonight determined to seek and do His Will in our daily lives, we can prove the truth that 'God meets us at every corner' and we can discover more of His Nature and His Purpose. His Mercy and His Love as He reveals Himself to us in the Familiar and the Unexpected.
