SHAPED BY GOD: MINSTER COMMUNITIES UPDATE - from Rev'd. Rick Tett

As you may already know, the Woodfield Team has been selected along with 12 other churches surrounding Coalville to be part of a pilot scheme.

So far, we have had two meetings of representatives from across our parishes and the Diocese Parish Transition team, one online the other in person, to look at how we start to have conversations that will shape what a minster community here might look like.

The next meeting to be held will be at the end of June where we will begin to look at where we are now. Our collective task over the summer is then to come back to our churches and reflect on our current strengths, as well as any areas where we think it might be beneficial to work together. We will be asked to consider our existing assets, our vision and mission, and what this process means for us.

Many of us may feel daunted or uncertain as to where this may take our team, others may be feeling positive and hopeful for beneficial changes that will grow our churches and perhaps even our personal faith. Both are

natural responses as we try to discern our way forward as members of our own church, the Woodfield Team, and the new minster community we are figuring out. Please join us with open hearts and in prayer for guidance and wisdom as we journey together:

Eternal God, you call your people to fullness of life in you and promise to be with us in all the changing scenes of life: may we be shaped by you in our lives and communities to refresh the Church, transform the world, and build the Kingdom, as with thanksgiving for the past, we step out in hope and trust into your future. 'Minster Communities – Pilot Scheme' was discussed by PCC at it last meeting and minuted as follows:

An invitation to the Woodfield Team to join a discussion towards forming a Minster Community with parishes in Coalville area had been received with a response required by 30th May 2022. The invitation had been circulated to the PCC and it had been agreed that this PCC wished to join the discussion, with the provisos that the whole team agreed to this and that the team could withdraw from the discussions at any point.

The Team Vicar (Rev. Rick Tett) had been asked whether there was a consensus across the team and whether a response to the invitation had been given. The reply is awaited.

If the team were to join the discussion, there would be a small working group developing the proposed new Community and the team would need representation on it. The team's plans were not known, but it was agreed that we would like to become involved. Norma Morris-Chapman offered to join the working group if that were appropriate. The team vicar was to be asked how he saw the way forward.

SEA SUNDAY

Over many years the 2nd Sunday of July has been kept as Sea Sunday, with a special focus on prayer for all seafarers. The Mission to Seafarers supports the work of sailors facing difficult waters, piracy, and separation from loved ones for long periods at sea.

However, we can also experience storms in our own lives. In Acts 27 we read how Paul was being taken as a prisoner to Rome, when he was caught in a storm off Crete. After 14 days they were shipwrecked on the island of Malta.

Paul had warned the crew that it wasn't a safe time of year to sail: *"I can see that our voyage is going to be disastrous and bring great loss to ship and cargo, and to our own lives."* However, Paul's words were ignored, and the ship sailed into a violent storm. By the third day they *'finally gave up all hope of being saved.*' How do we face up to storms in our lives? Do we worry and panic? God doesn't necessarily prevent storms from taking place, but we can trust His purpose through them.

Paul urged the sailors to *"keep courage, because not one of you will be lost, only the ship will be destroyed."* His confidence rested on an angelic promise: *"Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you."* Only the sovereign God, who created the wind and waves, can promise to save people from a storm. What does this mean for us in our circumstances today? *'Through many dangers, toils and snares I have already come. Grace has brought me safe thus far, and grace will lead me home.*' (Amazing Grace: John Newton).
