POPPY DAY SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY NOVEMBER 12th 10.30am

Temporary closure of our church building requires us to rethink how we might mark this occasion that so many of you find special in the church's year.

We hope to be able to hold the service outdoors at the War Memorial Garden.

We will have no sound amplification and so we need to gather in reasonable close proximity.

By necessity the service will be shortened and will take on a slightly different format.

But the important parts of the service, most of the liturgy, words and prayers will still be included but we may need to omit the hymns and the address.

The Roll of Honour will still be called, Bugle Calls of 'Last Post and Reveille' will mark the beginning and end of our 2 minute's silence and we will lay our poppy wreaths of remembrance at the gates.

GOD --- THE LIFE FORCE OF EVERYTHING

It is clear that autumn is here again, despite some warm and sunny days.

Cooler mornings, leaves starting to change, blackberries to pick, cobwebs in your face - all part of summer ending and autumn beginning.

It is also of course the time of harvest, many fields have already been combined, potatoes are being lifted, plums harvested, the fruit of the land taken in for our enjoyment.

They celebrated the fruit of the land and gave thanks to God, as we still do today in our Harvest Festivals.

But God also chose the Pentecost festival to pour out the Holy Spirit on the infant church. He planted the seed of his life in his followers, fed and watered it by the Spirit, and then waited for the harvest.

And the harvest was that Christianity spread throughout the whole world, bringing the knowledge of the love of God to all nations.

As we look for the harvest from the land so may we also look for a harvest in our lives and communities; a harvest that gives thanks to God and continues to reach out with care and support to others.

PROJECT HEART

Work on the transformation continues at pace. Removing the floorboards revealed large voids under the central pews which were much deeper than expected and the structural engineer advised that some needed consolidating before the block & beam floor could be laid.

. Additional large voids were found under the chancel. Most of the wooden floor beams were very woodwormed so failing. This was not foreseen of course because this is the first time it had been opened up since the floor had been laid in 1838.

The floors were also found to be out of level, front to back and sideways.

All necessitating extra work to adjust levels.

These essential extra floor works have by necessity eaten into our contingency budget to the tune of many thousands of pounds.

Our Foundation Is Love

In the coming Meditations I will be exploring a theme close to all of us-- *Love*. The most powerful, most needed, and most essential teaching is always about Love. Love is our foundation and love is our destiny. It is where we come from and where we're headed. As St. Paul famously says, "So faith, hope, and love remain, but the greatest of these is love" (1 Corinthians 13:13).

My hope, whenever I speak or write, is to help clear away the impediments to receiving, allowing, trusting, and participating in a foundational Love. God's love is planted inside each of us as the Holy Spirit who, according to Jesus, "will teach you everything and remind you of all that I told you" (John 14:26). Love is who you are.

All I can do is remind you of what you already know deep within your True Self and invite you to live connected to this Source. John the Evangelist writes, "God is love, and whoever remains in love, remains in God and God in him [and her]" (1 John 4:16). The Judeo-Christian creation story says that we were created in the very "image and likeness" of God--who is love (Genesis 1:26; see also Genesis 9:6). Out of the Trinity's generative, loving relationship, creation takes form, mirroring its Creator.

We have heard this phrase so often that we don't get the existential shock of what "created in the image and likeness of God" is saying about us. If we could believe it, we would save ourselves thousands' of dollars in therapy! If this is true--and I believe it is--our family of origin is divine. It is saying that we were created by a loving God to *be love* in the world. Our core is original blessing, not original sin. Our starting point is positive and, as it is written in the first chapter of the Bible, it is "very good" (Genesis 1:31). We do have a good place to go home. If the beginning is right, the rest is made considerably easier, because we know and can trust the clear direction of our life's tangent.

The great illusion we must all overcome is the illusion of separateness. It is the primary task of religion to Communicate, not worthiness but union, to reconnect people to their original identity "hidden with Christ in God" (Colossians 3:3). The Bible calls this state of separateness "sin."

God's job description is to draw us back

into this primal and intimate relationship. "My dear people, we are already children of God; what we will be in the future has not yet been fully revealed, and all I do know is that we shall be like God" (1 John 3:2). **Gateway to Silence** - God's life is living itself in me.
